RE: REPORT TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Since the March 3, 2021 meeting of the Executive Committee, IAC staff attended recent planning / design meetings for Commodore John Rodgers PK-8 #27 and Cross Country EM #247, and for the three High School Plan (HSP) projects:

- Frederick Douglass HS #450 / Joseph Briscoe SE #451,
- Baltimore City College HS 481, and
- Baltimore Polytechnic Institute HS #403 / Western HS #407

Staff is now working to update the gross area baseline (GAB) for the #450 / #451 project and for the #403 / #407 project based on the most-recent enrollment projections. The GAB describes the right-size gross square footage needed to deliver all state-required educational programs and services to a given enrollment, and is used to set the upper limit of state participation in capital school construction.

In addition, staff is working with the Maryland Stadium Authority (MSA) to develop administrative procedures for the Built-to-Learn (BTL) program — which will be used to construct the HSP projects; and with LEAs across the state to identify BTL projects.

Current Status:

Year 1 Schools

- Ten of the eleven Year 1 buildings, housing eleven schools, are open and occupied.
- Patterson/Claremont construction continues with the new building nearing completion. Mechanical and electrical equipment startups, flooring and final finishes and site work are ongoing. Installation of kitchen equipment is starting. Completion of the new building is scheduled for summer 2021. Patterson students will relocate to the new building in July 2021, at which time the existing building will be demolished and the site work completed. The Claremont students will relocate to the Patterson building in summer 2022.

Year 2 Schools

- Seven of the seventeen Year 2 buildings housing eight schools are open and occupied. The most recent schools, Medfield Heights and Walter P. Carter/Lois T Murray, had virtual ribbon cuttings and opened in January 2021 Six additional buildings housing seven schools will open by the end of 2021.
- Govans construction is nearing completion. Mechanical and electrical equipment startups, flooring and final finishes and site work are ongoing. Installation of kitchen equipment is starting Scheduled for a summer 2021 opening.
- Harford Heights construction is nearing completion. Exterior work excluding work related to phase 2 (March Building Demolition) is nearing completion with playgrounds expected to be installed the last week of May. Interior work is also nearing completion with casework 95% installed. The building is completely conditioned and commissioning has started. Interior punch lists are being developed by the CM and architect. The building has both permanent power and gas installed. Scheduled for a summer 2021 opening.
- Calverton construction is nearing completion. Drywall installation and flooring are nearing completion with wood flooring for the gym as well as carpet in the media center and VCT in the corridors and cafeteria remaining. Window installation is 95% complete with curtain wall in progress. Site work, ceiling tile, casework, and plumbing fixture installation are in progress. The black top play area and parking lot are completed. Scheduled for a summer 2021 opening.
- Cross Country The Schematic Design submission was submitted on May 11 2021. Comments were received on May 25, 2021 and will be sent to the A/E following review. The overall design is anticipated to be complete in December 2021. Construction is expected to commence with demolition of the existing building in fall 2021 with completion of the new building and site work in summer 2023.
- James Mosher construction is nearing completion. The building enclosure is nearing completion with work in isolated areas. Interior framing, drywall, insulation, ceiling grid, MEP rough-ins and new utility installation is complete. VCT flooring, casework installation, interior wood doors, MEP trim out & all other finishes are nearing completion. Exterior sitework is progressing, with landscaping in the near future. Scheduled for a summer 2021 opening.
- Robert Coleman construction is nearing completion. The building enclosure is nearing completion with work in isolated areas. Interior framing, drywall, insulation, ceiling grid, MEP rough-ins and new utility installation are complete. VCT flooring, casework

installation and other finishes are on-going. Exterior sitework is progressing and landscaping has begun. Scheduled for a summer 2021 opening.

- Northwood construction continues. Exterior masonry is 40% complete. Interior wall framing is 95% complete and wall close in inspections are in progress. MEP rough in work continues in all areas of the building and underground utilities and site work are underway. Scheduled for fall 2021 completion and a January 2022 opening.
- Montebello Montebello GMP 1 construction continues. GMP 2 for the balance of the construction approved by the MSA Board on April 6, 2021 and BPW on April 21, 2021. The parking lot at the corner of Harford Rd. and 32nd St. is being eliminated and other options are under development in response to community concerns. Scheduled for a summer 2022 opening.
- Highlandtown 237 Construction Document are 100% complete and the project is in the GMP Development Phase with bids received 5/27/2021. Approval of the GMP is expected by the MSA Board and BPW in July. Scheduled for a summer 2022 opening.

INTRODUCTION

Seventeen of the twenty-eight school buildings approved under the program are complete. Of the eleven remaining, eight are under construction, two are in various stages of design development through preconstruction, and one is in the feasibility/planning phase. Between June to August 2021, six buildings will be completed, making the program substantially complete, with only five remaining in Plan Year 2.

SCHOOL BUILDING PLAN AMENDMENTS

City Schools reviews and modifies the plan yearly to reflect any necessary updates as part of its Annual Review of Schools. The table below reflects recommendations that were approved on March 9, 2021.

FEASIBILITY STUDIES

All Plan Year 1 feasibility studies are complete. Plan Year 2's final study of Commodore John Rodgers E/M is substantially complete; however, the budget is over by ~\$5-million on the least expensive option that meets the Ed Specs. Some of this added cost is because the school does not have a legal agreement/ ROW in place with the adjoining apartment building that we have been using for service access to the school's kitchen/ cafeteria area. The design has been revised to resolve this concern. The team is currently investigating opportunities for cost savings prior to concluding the studies.

The high school program is nearing completion.

- **City College** is the first of the five schools to have its study complete, receiving concurrence with enrollment and the Gross Area Baseline from the IAC, as well as having its budget estimates reconciled.
- Frederick Douglass/ Briscoe has both studies complete. IAC consensus was achieved on the student enrollment and Gross Area Baseline through legislative action HB 51. Budget estimates are pending.
- **Baltimore Polytechnic/ Western** has approved studies for both schools that mitigate the current deficiencies. IAC consensus is pending on the student enrollment and Gross Area Baseline, and the preliminary budget estimates are being evaluated.

Upon review and approval of the final submissions by City Schools leadership and the Board of Commissioners, the projects will be queued for design and construction under the Built to Learn Act.



UTILIZATION RATES/ SURPLUS

The District continues to work toward reducing the number of facilities within its portfolio to achieve an increase of district-wide utilization without sacrificing quality educational opportunities for all students.

District-wide utilization in SY24-25 is projected to be 83 percent, but we continue to reach decisions through the Annual Review to right-size the portfolio and impact district utilization. There are four potential surplus buildings under review: Garrison Middle, Chinquapin, George W. F. McMechen, and Claremont. If they are indeed surplused, district utilization in SY24-25 is projected to be 85 percent.

STAFFING UPDATES

The 21st Century School Buildings Program Office created one new position, and reclassified three as follows:

- **Operational Support Specialist III** Created to support the growing number of schools with technology. Candidates were interviewed and a selection made. Start date is pending final approval.
- Senior Project Manager This position has been abolished and reclassified with the specialty position of Director - Engineering & Operations, which was created to support HVAC & VRF design, construction, and warranty in 21st century schools.
- Manager Engineering and Operations This position has been abolished and reclassified as a Senior Project Manager - Engineering & Operations/HVAC. This position will be a lead position with a specialization in HVAC & VRF systems.
- **Program Coordinator Public Relations** This position has been abolished and replaced with the **Associate Engagement Assistant**. This position will assist the Engagement and FF&E team with administrative tasks, as well as provide support for furniture inventory and student transportation.

FINANCE UPDATE

The proposed **Fiscal Year (FY) 2022 Operating Budget** for the 21st Century School Buildings Program Office is projected to be \$5,934,677.00, of which \$2,216,359.00 is supplemental funding for student transportation, as well as salary, benefits, and training for full-time and partially reimbursed employees. The budget was approved by the Board of Commissioners on May 13, 2021. The budget will be sent to the MSA for approval in June.

With the resumption of in-person learning, student transportation restarted February 2021. The monthly cost is approximately \$110,500 for the 17 buses serving the eight schools in Swing locations.

DESIGN & CONSTRUCTION

The office is gearing up for the acceptance of six buildings (eight school programs) under construction for delivery between June and August 2021. This is the largest one-year delivery in the history of the program. The openings are staggered based on the construction progress of each school. Multiple site visits are occurring at each project daily, as part of the school readiness process.



City Schools Design & Construction Dept. issued updated Design Standard Guidelines April 7, 2021. Two schools left to be designed -- Cross Country & Commodore John Rogers, as well as future 21st Century, and Built to Learn projects will comply with the new recommendations as governed under the MOU.

FURNITURE, FIXTURES & EQUIPMENT (FF&E) ASSET MANAGEMENT



The Design team generated FF&E layouts; developed procurement packages; and created delivery and installation work plans for each of the eight buildings scheduled to open in Summer 2021.

Purchase orders were issued to the two approved furniture vendors -- Duron and School Specialty, to procure over 25,100 items, most of which are scheduled for delivery between May 10, and August 13, 2021.

To date, only one supply chain issue has surfaced,

which is the epoxy tabletops used for science and technology classrooms. The expectation is that these will be delivered in late-August. Multiple site logistics, coordination, and installation planning meetings are being held to ensure concurrent deliveries and installations are managed effectively.

TECHNOLOGY

The Technology team is ramping up for the opening of the new schools. PO's have been issued for IT devices at all eight schools including ~417 Windows devices for staff; 690 iPads and 2,746 Chromebooks for students use, as well as desktops, cameras, and printers. Apple devices have arrived and are in storage



pending configuration.

Order fulfilment for Windows devices and desktop computers are being monitored due to a glass shortage and other component delays. A contingency plan is in process with City Schools ITD for loaner equipment as a back-up.

Three temporary associates have been hired to assist with deployment, and the Tech teams are performing onsite visits for technology readiness to support both summer and fall school openings.

21ST CENTURY ACADEMICS

Baltimore City Public Schools has developed an academic planning process to support its schools with creating inspiring education environments. The table below shows the academic focus areas that have been identified as of May 2021 for the schools that will open during the 2021- 2022 school year.

Logistics has been working diligently planning the relocation of the five swing schools, as well as six additional schools slated to merge and close, or are being surplused back to the City.

Multiple move vendor walkthroughs, and meetings are ongoing with principals, academic and district staff, move vendors, and PMs for a successful relocation. To date, the following is in process:

- ~ 13,915 boxes and 20,900 labels delivered to begin packing and purging of educational materials.
- +370 recycling bins and +16 roll-offs/ dumpsters provided for the disposal of old educational materials, and FFE items.
- CTE equipment has been assessed and inventoried for re-use or surplus.
- Salvageable materials & equipment are scheduled be inventoried by facilities for use at other schools.

21st CENTURY STUDENT INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

A virtual/ hybrid program has been confirmed for 2021. The student recruitment was completed in January 2021, and in March 2021 fifteen City Schools students participated in "pre-work" training (6-weeks, 60 hours total). Of these, fourteen students completed the training.

The students are currently participating in workshops learning new skills and, receiving a \$50/weekly stipend. Job placement is in progress for the students to begin work June through August 2021.

The renaming for James Mosher and Calverton will officially be in effect July 1, 2021. The Baltimore City School Board approved a new campus name for the Harford Heights/Sharp- Leadenhall school building. The approved campus name will be the **William C. March Memorial Campus** in honor of the late William C. March and his dedication to Baltimore City.

The team also hosted the first Feasibility Study Meeting for the Baltimore Polytechnic Institute/Western High School Project. It was well attended, with just over 100 people registered, and just shy of 60 people in attendance. The attendees included staff, elected officials, parents, and alumni as far reaching as China.

COMMUNICATIONS

The team has been managing ongoing communications around community meetings, and general program information. The **Spring Newsletter** sent out in April, was redesigned to show an updated and easy-to-read layout. This issue highlighted the status of each school, featured statistics regarding the Program, gave an introduction of the Program's academics department. Additionally, it informed audiences how schools are utilizing technology in the pandemic to continue teaching and engagement with students.



The communications team has also revamped its social media plan with a new strategy, content creation ideas, and posting frequency. Our team continues to collaborate with different departments for event documentation. For example, the "paint and chill" event Engagement hosted this month has reached over 1.5K people thus far on Facebook. This revamp started at the end of March 2021 and the metrics will be assessed quarterly. The Quarter One metrics is shown in the online presence increase stats above.
